DORMONT RECEIVES STATEWIDE RECOGNITION FOR ITS STORMWATER INITIATIVE BUT WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

Each year during Pennsylvania Local Government Week, eight Pennsylvania municipalities are identified to receive the Governor's Award for Excellence in Local Government. I am proud to announce that Dormont was selected #1 in the Building Community Partnerships category this year. Specifically, we were recognized for our "development of a collaborative partnership between residents and borough council to communicate, demonstrate and address stormwater management issues. The partnership, entitled Stormwater 101, supported community education efforts and increased support of Dormont's stormwater management plan."

Councilpersons Onnie Costanzo, and Joan Hodson along with Stormwater Committee Chairman Frank Stumpo traveled to Harrisburg to receive this prestigious award on behalf of the Borough. Prior to the formal awards ceremony, Onnie, Joan and Frank were introduced on the floor of the Pennsylvania House of Representative by Delegate Dan Miller. Following their introduction, they were presented with a resolution from the House that congratulated the Borough of Dormont upon the meritorious honor which has been bestowed upon it; and offers best wishes for a continued tradition of success and leadership in local government initiatives.

I tell you all of this because not only is it so nice to see Dormont being recognized statewide for our accomplishments but mostly because water quality is the one major issue that we will all be hearing about more and more for the next several years. Here in Dormont- and Allegheny County wide- we are wrestling with how to deal with and pay for two water quality issues- both

related to the water quality of the Ohio River. They are: sewage collection and treatment and stormwater quality.

The sewage collection and treatment issue is covered by a consent decree and paid for by our monthly sewer fees. That money will cover the \$3-\$4 billion dollar construction costs that ALCOSAN and its member communities will need to meet the Federal Clean Water Act requirements. While the major construction projects are some years off, the sewer investigation and sewer lining and other repair activities that you see around town are part of the consent decree and are paid for out of our sewer fund.

The second water quality issue is stormwater. In Dormont, the problems are: 1) localized flooding and 2) the Federal Clean Water Act water quality standards that we must meet for the stormwater that we dump into Saw Mill Run. We have engineering cost estimates to fix our largest flooding problems in the Athens Alley and Latonia Avenue neighborhoods of approximately \$1 million. We must fix these problems because it is the right thing to do for our neighbors.

We must deal with the quality of the water that we dump into Saw Mill Run because it is also the right thing to do and because we are under state and Federal government mandates to do so. Specifically, we are being required to reduce the sediment that we contribute from 90 tons/year to 22 tons/year and to reduce the nutrients (phosphorous) that we contribute by 95%.

However, unlike the sanitary sewer repairs and upgrades, we have no fund to draw from to deal with the stormwater issues-either the flooding or the water

quality mandates. As you will recall, our Stormwater Committee and Council have been analyzing and studying this issue for a year. We will present the results of those studies as well as recommendations to you in a public workshop format sometime later this month so that we can get your comments and input before Council makes its final decision on how to proceed.

LETTER FROM SENATOR WAYNE FONTANA


Yellow Dot Program

I want to make everyone aware of a collaborative state program that can help save lives. Pennsylvania's Yellow Dot Program was created to assist citizens in the "golden hour" of emergency care following a traffic accident when they may not be able to communicate their needs themselves. Placing a yellow dot in your vehicle's rear window alerts first responders to check your glove compartment for vital information to ensure you receive the medical attention you need. This program is a cooperative effort among PennDOT, PA Department of Health, PA Department of Aging, PA State Police, and PA Turnpike Commission, first responders and local law enforcement.

Participants complete a personal information form which includes the participant's name, contact information, emergency contact information, medical history and medications, allergies, and the participant's physicians' contact information. A photo showing only the participant's head and shoulders is then taped on the spot allocated in the booklet. The completed information booklet with the attached photo is then placed into the vehicle's dashboard glove compartment.

The yellow dot decal, provided in the program kit, is placed in the lower left corner of the vehicle's rear window. This decal alerts first responders that vital information can be found in the vehicle.

Have you seen our displays? There are three places for you to do so. Two of them, the large window of Hometown Pharmacy, 2889 West Liberty Avenue, and the large case in Dormont Public Library, 2950 West Liberty Avenue, currently feature items representing the 50th anniversary of the Keystone Oaks School District.

Of course, our museum in the lower level of the Municipal Center, 1444 Hillsdale Avenue, is the third place. Its two rooms and connecting hall are filled with displays of memorabilia that represent Dormont's early businesses, the interests of its residents, and the changes in its schools through the years. There also are files of in-

formation and a register of Dormont veterans from World War I to the present that you may look at with the help of a volunteer.

The history of the Dormont/Keystone Oaks Schools is evident through many items used in the classrooms from early to recent years and our complete set of high school yearbooks, the Torch.



2015 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

As we begin the summer of 2015, the Borough is looking to complete the following sewer related construction projects:

2015 Sanitary Sewer Repair/Maintenance Program

Under this year's sewer maintenance program the Borough will be proceeding with several sanitary sewer projects. Last summer we internally inspected, with robot cameras 14,600 linear feet of sanitary sewer main. This inspection identified various sewers in need of some type of repair. Based upon this inspection the Borough issued three (3) different contracts to make the required repairs.

1. For those sewer lines where there are a number of defects, such as significant cracking, pipe deformation and groundwater infiltration, these sewers were lined from manhole to manhole. On March 2, 2015 Council approved a contract with Insight Pipe contracting, LP to install cured-in-place liners an approximately 2,450 linear feet of sewer main. This work was completed in April.
2. For those sewers where we identified isolated defects and/or significant infiltration at a joint or lateral, where manhole to manhole lining is cost prohibitive, we will be performing spot lining and grouting. On April 6, 2015 Council approved a contract with Robinson Pipe Cleaning, Co. to make repairs at nine (9) different locations.
3. A third contract was issued on April 6, 2015 for repairs where it will be necessary to excavate to make the repairs. This project was completed in April. Under this contract repairs at seven (7) locations were completed in April

In addition to the repair contracts above, later this year as required under the Administrative consent order (ACO) with PADEP, we will be performing our annual televising and preventive maintenance (O&M) work. Under this project we will clean and televise approximately 20% of the Borough's sanitary sewers, to identify the sewers for next year's sewer repair contracts.

There is also one other sewer related project that is on-going in the Borough. In March of last year Columbia Gas of Pennsylvania met with representatives of the Borough to discuss a sewer televising project that they would be doing throughout the state in all municipalities where they have gas lines. Under this project where gas lines were installed after 1970, all sanitary and storm sewers would be televised. This CCTV inspection would include sanitary sewer laterals. This CCTV project includes the sewers in approximately 70% of the streets south of West Liberty Avenue and 30% of the streets on the north side. The reason for this CCTV inspection is that the gas company is looking for "cross-bores". The gas company defines a "cross-bore" as when their gas main goes through another utility. "Cross-bores" can occur when gas lines are moled under streets and sidewalks, going through sewer mains and laterals, which may be at the same depth as the gas line. When a "cross bore" is identified Columbia Gas of Pennsylvania will eliminate the "cross-bore" and make the needed repairs to the sewer or lateral. This work began in April of this year and is anticipated to be finished in June. The benefit to the Borough is that all the CCTV inspection data will be turned over to the Borough providing valuable information about the condition of our sewers without any cost to the Borough. With this information we will be better able to plan for and design future repair projects.



Citizens Advisory Committee

In May of 2014, several members of Council, the Manager along with department heads toured the Borough in order to see firsthand, the condition of our assets. We found many in major need of repair (See the report on the Borough's website -Click on Departments, then Finance and then Long Range Financial Plan). The best way to ensure our assets are repaired or replaced plus a multitude of other capital needs in the Borough was to plan first and then implement. Under the direction of Onnie Costanzo, Chair of the Council's Finance Committee, a Citizens Advisory Committee for the Long Range Financial Plan was developed. Four individuals with diverse interest and visions were asked to join the committee. Their directive was to study Dormont's 2014 Comprehensive Plan, the Report on Council Borough Asset Assessment Fact Finding Tour and the budget and talk about what they feel is important and where our money should be spent long range. They are strictly an Advisory Committee. The purpose is to see our capital expenditures from their perspectives. Taking the committee's advice into consideration, we will develop a Long Range Financial Plan. The committee meets once a month under the guidance of our Interim manager, Rebecca Bradley, and Onnie Costanzo. We are still in the initial learning phase. The Citizens Advisory Committee members who volunteer their time are Pat Bibro, Lauren Smathers, Sarann Fisher and Kenneth R. Krugh Jr.

The Borough of Dormont's Ad Hoc Stormwater Committee, a group of residents from areas throughout the Borough, developed a public education campaign called Stormwater 101. A series of informational fliers, each written by a different committee member, addressing topics such as "what is stormwater", "why does it matter" and "how does it affect me" were mailed to all borough residents.



Keystone Oaks Buildings to Undergo MAJOR SIDEWALK, PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENTS this Summer

At a Special Voting Meeting on Thursday, April 9, 2015, the Keystone Oaks Board of School Directors awarded a contract to Mele & Mele & Sons, Inc. for the purpose of District campus site improvements at all four campuses. The amount of the contract is \$2,366,950.64.

Extensive work will take place at each building, including the replacement of sidewalks and staircases as well as new parking lots. Work is expected to take place through the summer.

The District will communicate changes in traffic patterns, building entrance closures, parking restrictions and any complete building closures via the

District's website, Facebook and Twitter pages. The District will also communicate via e-mail through the District's School Messenger system and principal e-mail blasts as needed.

At Dormont Elementary, one entrance will remain open at all times to accommodate Extended Day's summer program as well as the various summer camps and programs taking place in the building. One entrance of the Middle/High School campus will remain open at all times, however, there may be days where public parking is prohibited and a "drop-off only" restriction is in place for students participating in athletic practices or other activities.



FREE MEALS Available THROUGH SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM

This summer, Keystone Oaks is sponsoring a Summer Lunch program in which any child 18 years of age or younger will be able to receive a free, nutritious bagged lunch every weekday between June 15, 2015 and August 14, 2015.

There will be a minimum of three drop off sites, one each in Castle Shannon, Dormont and Green Tree. The program is open to any child, from any community, who is under the age of 18. No photo identification or sign up is required.

"We are excited to have the opportunity to provide this program to children living in and around the Keystone Oaks communities," said Kevin Lloyd, Keystone Oaks Director of Food Services. "Often times, children rely on school lunches and, in the summertime, do not have access to a filling, nutritious lunch. Our goal is to be able to fill that void and to get kids the food they need and deserve."


KEYSTONE OAKS Accepting Nominations for Alumni Achievement Award

"The effectiveness of full-day kindergarten in improving academic and emotional/social learning has been documented in numerous validated research studies found in educational journals over the years," said Assistant Superintendent Kathy Foster, Ed.D. "Benefits of a full-day program are significant, especially for historically underperforming groups of students, such as those who are economically disadvantaged, those who have special needs and others who are English Language Learners."

The full-day kindergarten program will afford students the opportunity to participate in expanded activities in all curricular areas, including language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, and technology. Students will have more opportunities available to them for both remediation and enrichment during the school day. In addition to expanded curriculum options, opportunities will also be available for learning center activities, fine/gross motor skills practice, writing workshops, and sharing/planning time as a group - to name only a few.
